

Grade 1-3-Julia, a young girl with Crohn's disease, tells her friend that when she sits on the toilet for a long time she constructs toilet-paper flowers to make herself feel better. This launches a discussion between the two girls about how painful, depressing, and embarrassing the condition is. While the author, who suffers from the disease, is an expert in gastroenterology, his attempt to explain it to children is unsuccessful. The writing is stilted, and the illustrations are static, featuring two orange-tinted, very wide-eyed girls. While well-intentioned, this title misses the mark.-Christine A. It is exciting that there is a children's book about Crohn's. The author is a doctor with Crohn's, so the information in the book is factual and there are great notes preceding and following the story. However, the quality of this book is pretty poor. It is unrealistic. The whole subject of Crohn's get brought up because the mother serves her daughter a different snack than she does her daughter's friend. No child is going to believe that a mother would do that. Also, the way the children talk to each other isn't credible. The pictures are also not very well done, but I guess they get the job done. It is nice that children will have a book available to them about Crohn's but it is poor literature. I was disappointed. Children with Crohn's deserve a well written, well illustrated book, and I am still waiting for it.

My mother bought this book for my daughter, who was recently diagnosed with Crohn's. It presents the topic of Crohn's disease in a way that is appropriate for a young audience. It includes medical terminology (e.g. "colonoscopy") and includes realistic details (multiple trips to the bathroom, lactose intolerance) but does not overwhelm with too much information. As other reviews note, the "story" is mostly dialogue between the characters and a little stilted; however, kids with Crohn's need models to help them find ways to understand and talk about this distressing and complex disease. I am grateful to find a book that provides that model, and my daughter enjoyed recognizing parts of her own experience in the book. I would recommend this book for kids, families, and teachers of children who are coping with Crohn's.

Toilet Paper Flowers isn't perfect, but then having Crohn's is a deeply personal disease that is difficult to share with others. I know because I live with Crohn's disease. It is an unwelcome visitor in my life, but one I must live with. So, how does one child explain her disease to another? Perhaps the story is a bit stilted, but a child with Crohn's is very informed of their disease and passing this information off to a friend can be difficult. The segway into the conversation is why one child has one snack and the other child has something different. I can so relate. Many is the time I have to eat something very different from the people around me and it is a great way to introduce the subject. So, if the conversations between the kids is a bit stilted, well, so be it. The introduction is superb as is the ending and while the pictures are sweet they are not very well done. However, making toilet paper flowers in the bathroom is a unique idea, one I will try the next time I am stuck in the bathroom. This is a good book for kids and parents. A unique idea was used to pull the story together and I, for one, appreciate it.

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
